### NUMBER OF FAMILIES SUFFERING LONG-TERM UNEMPLOYMENT SOARS

The latest unemployment data shows a 51 percent increase in the number of parents suffering long-term unemployment compared with one year ago, according to an analysis by the Children's Defense Fund (CDF). The rapid rise in the number of parents unemployed for more than six months indicates that the poor economy is having an increasingly devastating impact on families with children. As of June 2003, there were 655,000 parents suffering long-term unemployment, up from 433,000 in June 2002 and more than triple the number in June 2001.

CDF examined the number of long-term unemployed parents with children younger than 18, focusing on January 2000 through June 2003, the latest month available. Long-term unemployment is defined as seeking work for longer than 26 weeks. CDF's computer analysis used person-by-person data from the federal government's monthly Current Population Survey, the source of official unemployment statistics. The analysis found:

- In June 2003, 655,000 parents suffered long-term unemployment.
- The June 2003 figure marks a one-month jump of 20 percent (up from 547,000 in May 2003); is a 51 percent increase compared with June 2002; and is more than triple the level in June 2001 (196,000).
- One out of every 100 American parents was out of work and suffering long-term unemployment in June 2003, the highest proportion since at least January 2000.<sup>2</sup>


These 655,000 long-term unemployed parents were among the 14.8 million parents who were without work in June 2003. Specifically, 2.8 million parents were unemployed (that is, actively seeking work) and another 12 million were not looking for work.

The long-term unemployment trends for parents parallel the figures for Americans overall released by the U.S. Department of Labor.<sup>3</sup> Those figures show that the number of Americans unemployed longer than 26 weeks roughly tripled since June 2001. The number of Americans suffering long-term unemployment in June stood at its highest level in a decade. Long-term unemployment began to increase steadily in the months after September 2001.

<sup>&</sup>lt;sup>2</sup> For technical reasons, Current Population Survey estimates of numbers of persons after January 2003 are not strictly comparable with estimates for earlier months, due to updates resulting from the 2000 Census. However, figures on *proportions* of individuals are generally comparable, according to the Labor Department. The trend in the proportion of parents suffering long-term unemployment confirms the trend in the numbers of such parents; both trends tell a story of dramatic increases since 2001 and 2002.

The findings are among the latest signs of how families with children increasingly are suffering from the weak economy that began in 2001. A Labor Department report released quietly last month found that the number of working poor families rose in 2001. The number of families with children that had at least one family member in the labor force for at least half of the year, yet who had income below the federal poverty line, rose by 143,000 — or 5 percent — between 2000 and 2001. The poverty line was \$14,128 for a family of three in 2001.
